NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS AND STEWARDSHIP

The beginning of the year is a popular time for personal reassessment. The earth has finished one more revolution around the sun, and swings low over the cold January horizon, just like last year. The days are shorter, and an evening of introspection seems more inviting. Somehow, when we take down the old calendar and tack up the new, we sense an opportunity to make a fresh start.

To make the best of this opportunity — which, truthfully, exists in June just as it does in January — it is useful to make firm commitments. It's even more useful to write them down. These resolutions, kept in a desk drawer or on the refrigerator door, are a "hard copy" of our best intentions for self-improvement. They're signposts that redirect our lives towards good, and towards God.


New Year's resolutions are often focused on personal health — losing weight, relaxing more, or smoking less. It is certainly important, of course, to take good care of our bodies. But Christianity offers us a fuller concept of self-improvement. St. Paul reminds us that both the body and the soul need an exercise program. In fact, every aspect of our persons — physical, mental, spiritual, emotional — can benefit from an annual self-audit.

Some people have taken to heart this multi-faceted concept of the self, and each year make one resolution for each area. For instance, one could resolve to join a Rosary prayer group to work on spirituality, or take a continuing education course to build mental skills. Still, others use the three theological virtues — faith, hope and love — to guide their resolution-making process.

By now you may have discerned a similarity between New Year's resolutions and stewardship commitments. First, we use a similar method to think about stewardship, by breaking it down into more specific concepts — time, talent and treasure. Second, to become better stewards, we write down our commitments. We record our good intentions to clarify exactly what they are — and to remind us of our commitment on the evenings when the Rosary group interferes with a bowl game.

Any serious commitment shares the same components — it is specific, and it is written. From marriages to mortgages, treaties to trades — serious resolutions are spelled out, both literally and figuratively.

But even more important than the methodology of a commitment is the heart of the person who makes it. Even the most well-written job descriptions are useless unless there is someone to do the job well! Let us pray that this new year is a time of grace and wisdom for those of us who seek to recommit our lives to our family, our parish, and our God.

VALUE OF THE OUTREACH CENTER

As part of the recently completed Capital Campaign at St. Patrick – St. Anthony, the Job Seeker Program has moved into its new home. We relocated into the newly created Outreach Center in February 2018. We continue to enjoy our new location after nearly a year and are grateful for our present-day surroundings:

Outreach Center:

- Offers separate waiting areas for both Job Seeker and Food Pantry ministries which provides larger work space for workers and volunteers to serve clients and improves operating capacity allowing them to achieve their ultimate goal of serving the community
- Easy access walking on level ground entering and exiting the Outreach Center; eliminates the issue for physically challenged Job Seeker's and Food Pantry benefactors to maneuver stairs for appointments; this was previously required to obtain services in the basement of the old parish offices

Job Seekers Office:

- Yields availability for West Michigan WORKS! to have Career Coaches meet with clients in Grand Haven who have transportation barriers traveling to Holland for appointments and allows them a presence in the Tri-Cities area once again
- Provides office space for a counselor on a bi-weekly basis
- Maintains privacy for meetings and more secure area for client files
- Displays freshly painted walls and renovated offices to present an inviting atmosphere for our job seeker clients

If you haven't had a chance to visit us yet, please feel free to stop in at any time to see our permanent home. The Job Seekers office is open Tuesday - Thursday from 10:00 A.M. TO 2:00 P.M.



SUPPORTING THE HAITI SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

When Bud and I first went to Haiti, we saw so many needs that we were overwhelmed with all that needed to be done. When we came home, we still felt that no matter what we did, we probably couldn't make a dent in solving the needs of the people in our parish in Morne Hopital. Then we asked the people of Haiti what they wanted. Was it food, clothing, clean water, health care? It appeared that they needed all these things. But the one thing they asked for was EDUCATION FOR THEIR CHILDREN. We probably would have put that far down the list if we were doing it our way. But solidarity asks us to ask people what they want and need. And there began a 20 year commitment to bring education to SS Simon and Jude parish.

Over the years our parish updated the primitive school that existed there. We hire qualified teachers. We supply books and school supplies. And we provide scholarships. As the years passed it became necessary to provide secondary school (grades 7-13). To enroll children in these higher grades required more money than our St. Patrick-St. Anthony tithe could provide. Thus began the Haiti Scholarship Program. For \$250/year we can send a student to school. Right now, friends of the Haiti program provide 69 scholarships. 200 students are enrolled in these grades. We become missionaries to bring education to someone who would not be able to progress farther than Grade 6. We equip Haitian students to live a fuller life, go on to college or trade school and fulfill their parents' wishes for education. Bud and I consider it a privilege to support our student every year until he finishes school. Then we will give another student that opportunity for as long as we are able. We would encourage anyone who feels a missionary longing to do the same. ~Mary Lothschutz

What is Alpha?

Alpha is a series of sessions exploring faith. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation, with no judgement. Alpha is run all around the globe, and everyone's welcome. It runs in cafés, churches, universities, homes—you name it. No two Alphas look the same, but generally they have three key things in common: food, a talk and good conversation.

St. Patrick – St. Anthony Parish had the pleasure of hosting our first 12 week session of ALPHA with more than 80 participants / group leaders. The evening began with an awesome dinner and great conversation. After dinner, Grant Wyatt often led us in worship music and then, we watched the ALPHA video, breaking out into small groups afterwards.
