Fr. Roosevelt will be here from Oct. 8-13 to share the news of our sister parish in Haiti, Sts. Simon & Jude.



HAITI MINISTRIES HISTORY

Your help is a critical part of our ability to continue this ministry.

1995: Haiti Committee met for the first time. By 1996, The parish sent \$3,731 in fundraisers, sent toys, meds, and had monthly pancake breakfast to raise money.

1998: Sent 1,000 personal care packets, shipped a vehicle, t-shirts & sport shoes were collected. 14 parishioners & pastor visited to deliver 900 lbs. of good. Visits continued on a regular basis.

2022-2003: Raised \$1,100 per month for rectory, school and clinic. Rectory was restored, new roof built, generators installed. Eye clinic with Dr. Ventocilla fitted 966 eyeglasses. Scholarship fund started for high school students with 13 students. Currently there are 180.

2011: Eight parishioners visited and helped with repairs to buildings and visited local homes to assist with repairs caused by the earthquake.

2012: A team of parishioners visited the new computer lab, secondary school and a local food store that had opened. That fall a dental clinic was led by Dr. Dan Bowen and a team of parishioners.

2022: The parish sent funds to build a security wall around the parish, rectory, and school to add extra protection to the campus.

How do parishioners get food and water? Parishioners travel, often by foot or motorcycle, to Carrefour or Fontamara to purchase food and water. These communities are somewhat safer than downtown Port-au-Prince and they are accessible via back roads on the mountain. The main road on the mountain (to downtown Port- au- Prince) has been taken over by gangs, and it is currently closed.

Is school still functioning normally? School is still functioning normally. It is relatively safe on the mountain.

Where does the school purchase school

2024: Two new classrooms were built for the school for a total of 644 students.

Weather: Average temperature Winter months = 72 Summer months = 95 Hurricane season is June-November Dry season is November-March

Main food is rice and beans Tropical fruits like mangoes, bananas, pineapple; chicken, goat, turkey, fish

Given the insecurity in Haiti, how do teachers and students get to school (particularly those coming from Port-au-Prince)? The school now hires teachers and enrolls students from Carrefour or Fontamara rather than downtown Port-au-Prince. They travel to school via the back roads on the mountain. The trade school scholarship students attend school in Delmas now, another somewhat safer community.

Children love to play soccer and use whatever they can find for a ball--they loved it when we brought them soccer balls. They play a game similar to Jack's but with rocks.

For most children, lunch at school is the only meal of the day. Children who go to school know they are special, that they are gaining skills, and their education offers opportunities for the whole family. Students must pass exams at 6th, 9th, and 13th grade levels in order to move forward to their next class.


